

How to get from the Airport to the Hotel

By Car:

Take the East highway A4 direction Vienna and take the exit Erdberg. At Stadionbrücke turn left into Schlachthausgasse. At the end of the street turn right into Rennweg and turn right at the intersection Rennweg/Ungargasse into Ungargasse. You will see the Imperial Riding School Renaissance Vienna Hotel to your left.

Car Hire:

The airport's car rental center is on the level 0 of multi-storey car park 4 (P4) and can be reached by a short covered underground passage.

By Public Transportation:

a. By City Airport Train (CAT)

Upon landing at Vienna International Airport (Wien-Schwechat) take the CAT to its final destination Wien Mitte/Landstrasse. You arrive at the City Air Terminal. The journey takes 16 minutes. Take the tram line O (direction Migerkastraße) and get off at the second stop (Ungargasse/Neulinggasse). The Imperial Renaissance Hotel is located to your right.

By Taxi


Taxis in Vienna come in all colors, and are simply recognized by their roof taxi signs. There are currently around 150 eco-friendly cars with hybrid or natural gas-powered engines on Vienna's roads. You can order such a taxi by dialing "40100" and asking for a "Green Taxi", environmental or eco-taxi. You can identify your taxi by the "Green Taxi" sign. The good news: There is no difference in price over a ride in a conventional taxi.

Fares: Viennan taxis always should use the taximeter, which starts at $\in 2.50$. The kilometer price is $\in 1.20$, with slightly higher prices after 11pm. A surcharge of $\in 1$ is added for extra baggage.

Vienna

Location: 48.2088° N, 16.3726° E

Population: 1,714,142 **Area:** 414.6 km²

History:

The Romans called Vienna Vindobona. This name comes from the Celtic word Vendunia and translates as forest stream. The Celts named Vienna after the river by which the first settlements were located. But at that time, Vienna was not yet particularly important. Austria was officially mentioned in 996 AD under the Babenbergs. At the time it was called Ostarrichi, which meant "the kingdom in the east". In the middle of the 12th Century the Austria of Babenbergs had its heyday, and the rise of Vienna began. A hundred years later, the Babenberg dynasty came to an end. Today, only the red-white-red colors of the Austrian flag remain as a reminder of this important noble family. Under the Habsburgs, Austria became a country where the sun never set, as Austria, through its dominion over Spain, also possessed lands in



Mexico. When Rudolf von Habsburg was elected king in 1273, nobody yet suspected how many centuries the Habsburgs would reign in Austria and how large and powerful this empire would one day become. Austria reached a first peak under Emperor Maximilian I. He expanded the empire, introduced important reforms, erected sumptuous buildings, but waged no wars, rather practicing the politics of marriage. The next golden age of Austria came under Empress Maria Theresia. She also carried out important reforms, she was able to win strategic wars and she had many splendid buildings erected. The disintegration of Austria became apparent in the 19th Century, and under perhaps the most famous emperor and empress that Austria ever had: under Emperor Franz Joseph I and his wife Elisabeth, Sissi. Nation-states began forming all over Europe, and even in Austria this development could not be stopped. In 1914 the First World War began, and after its end in the year 1918 Austria was reduced to the small country as it is now.

Today

Vienna is the capital and largest city of Austria and one of the nine states of Austria. Vienna is Austria's primary city, with a population of about 1.731 million and is by far the largest city in Austria, as well as its cultural, economic, and political centre. It is the 9th-largest city by population in the

European Union. Until the beginning of the 20th century it was the largest German speaking city in the world, and before the First World War and the splitting of the Austro-Hungarian Empire the city had 2 million inhabitants. Vienna is host to many major international organizations, including the United Nations and OPEC. The city lies in the east of Austria and is close to the borders of the Czech Republic, Slovakia, and Hungary. These regions work together in a European Cent rope border region. Along with nearby Bratislava, Vienna forms a metropolitan region with 3 million inhabitants. In 2001, the city centre was designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Apart from being regarded as the City of Music because of its musical legacy, Vienna is also said to be "The City of Dreams" because it was home to the world's first psycho-analyst - Sigmund Freud. The City's roots lie in early Celtic and Roman settlements that transformed into a Medieval and Baroque city, the capital of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. It is well known for playing an essential role as a leading European Music Centre, from the great age of Viennese Classicism through the early part of the 20th century. The Historic centre of Vienna is rich in architectural ensembles, including Baroque castles and gardens, as well as the late-19th-century Ringstrasse lined with grand buildings, monuments and parks. In a 2005 study of 127 world cities, the Economist Intelligence Unit ranked the city first for the world's most livable cities. Each year since 2005, Vienna has been the world's number one destination for international congresses and conventions. Vienna attracts about five million tourists a year.

Weather

Vienna has a mild continental climate, even if the occasional winter's day is icy! The temperature in November lies between 2° C to 7° C.



Time

Vienna is in the Central European time zone (CET = GMT / UCT + 1). Daylight saving time applies from the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October (CEST).



Banks

Most banks in Vienna are open from Monday to Friday from 8.00 am to 12.30 pm and from 1.30 pm to 3.00 pm, and until 5.30 pm on Thursdays. In the city centre (1st district), almost all banks are open over lunchtime.



Post Office

Most post offices in Vienna are open between 8:00 am and 18:00 pm. Outside of the city centre, many postal counters are closed over lunch. Two post offices are open throughout the day in Vienna:

Shopping

Shops are usually open Monday to Friday from 9:00 - 18:30, Saturday until 17:00 or 18:00. Some shopping centers are open until 20:00 or 21:00 from Monday to Friday.



Electricity

In Vienna electrical current is 220 volts/50Hz and the European round 2-pin plugs are standard. Americans and Canadians with 110V equipment will need a transformer which changes the voltage and an adapter to fit Austrian sockets. These can be bought at any hardware store. British, Australians and South Africans can use a plug adapter which most department stores stock.



Special Needs

Pharmacy

Drugstores are open from Monday to Friday from 8.00 am - 6.00 pm, usually without a lunch break, and on Saturday from 8.00 am - 12.00 noon. Outside of these times, a 24-hour drugstore standby service is available throughout the city. Details of the nearest open drugstore are posted at every drugstore. Currency

The unit of currency is Euro (€). Major credit cards are accepted in most hotels, shops and restaurants. Travelers' cheques and currency can be changed at exchange bureaus.

St. Stephen's Cathedral

St. Stephen's Cathedral, Austria's most eminent Gothic edifice, houses a wealth of art treasures. The red-marble sepulcher of Emperor Frederick III, sculpted from 1467 to 1513 by Niclas Gerhaert van Leyden; the pulpit, a work from 1514-15 by Anton Pilgram; the Altarpiece of Wiener Neustadt (Wiener Neustädter Altar), a Gothic winged altar from 1447 - and the tomb of Prince Eugene of Savoy, dating from 1754.




